# Background

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## Background

In 1996, the North Carolina General Assembly passed the Charter School Act, thereby authorizing the establishment of "a system of charter schools to provide opportunities for teachers, parents, pupils, and community members to establish and maintain schools that operate independently of existing schools, as a method to accomplish all of the following:

- 1. Improve student learning;
- 2. Increase learning opportunities for all students, with special emphasis on expanded learning experiences for students who are identified as at-risk of academic failure or academically gifted;
- 3. Encourage the use of different and *innovative teaching methods*;
- Create new professional opportunities for teachers, including the opportunity to be responsible for the learning at the 4. school site;
- 5. Provide parents and students with expanded choices in the types of educational opportunities that are available within the public school system;
- Hold the schools established under this Part accountable for meeting measurable student achievement results and 6. provide the schools with a method to change from rule-based to performance-based accountability systems."

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# **Charter School Oversight**

- •SL 2023-110 or House Bill 618, converted the Charter Schools Advisory Board (CSAB) to the Charter Schools Review Board (CSRB).
- CSRB authority includes, but is not limited to, the approval of charter applications, the approval of material revisions to the charter agreement, and the renewal of charter agreements.
   House Bill 618 defines the role of the SBE to have the following
- •House Bill 618 defines the role of the SBE to have the following duties: rulemaking, funding, appeals, and accountability.
- Creates a right of appeal (re CSRB decisions) to SBE.

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## **Charter Closure/Termination**

Charter closures occur under a number of circumstances and fall into four categories: relinguishment, assumption, non-renewal, or revocation.

- $\succ$  Relinquishment occurs when a charter board voluntarily surrenders the charter.
- > Assumption occurs when a charter board's Charter Agreement is assumed by another charter board.
- > Non-renewal occurs when a charter board fails to receive a renewal term and the current Charter Agreement expires.
- > And finally, revocation occurs when a charter board's Charter Agreement is revoked pursuant to legal allowances for the termination of a charter.

At the conclusion of the 2022-2023 school year, two charter schools closed permanently due to non-renewal. Invest Collegiate Transform and Eastside STREAM Academy, both located in Charlotte Mecklenburg district, were nonrenewed by the State Board of Education.

## **Performance Framework**

The State Board of Education's 2025 Statewide Strategic Plan includes the following goal:

Goal II: Improve School and District Performance

Objective 8: Increase the number of charter schools meeting or exceeding academic, operational, and financial goals.

The Performance Framework reports on 46 operational, financial, and academic indicators. Some measurements were not applicable to all schools, such as required EMO/CMO reporting, posting of previous performance scores (not applicable to first year schools), and the renewal criteria.

## 2022-2023 Performance Framework

### •Operational

- 65% of charters achieved at or above 80% but less than 100% success in the category of operational annual monitoring criteria
- 34% were compliant in every applicable measure.
- Two schools fell below the 80% threshold, scoring 78% and 79% respectively.
- •Financial- Of the 206 operating charter schools in 2022-2023, 7 were reported as having cautionary or disciplinary financial status.

# Charter School Authorizing Staff NC Office of Charter Schools (OCS)



OCS serves as staff to CSRB and creates, implements, monitors, and supports the entire authorizing process from application creation to final ready to open status.



Once operating, OCS supports and monitors pursuant to the processes established for operating schools.



OCS supports both non-operating charter board applications and over 200 operating schools.



80% of authorizers have a ratio of no more than 10 schools per full-time employee. OCS currently provides a ratio of 26.25 per consultant.

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## **Funding and Membership**

- 22-23 fiscal year, charter schools received \$985,919,148 in state funding out of the \$11.9B Public School Budget
- State funds are based on ADM
- Federal funds are targeted to special populations
- Local funds based on local current expense appropriation in the county which the student resides
- Charter schools often pull students from many districts
