(g) Local Report. - No later than September 1 of each school year following at least six months of participation in the Program for that year, local boards of education participating in the Program shall report at least the following information to the Department of Public Instruction:

- (1) The number and amount of funds in tuition assistance awards provided to teacher assistants.
- (2) The number of teacher assistant recipients who achieved teacher licensure, including the period of time from the issue of an initial tuition assistance award to the time of achieving licensure.
- (3) The number of recipients who remained employed in the local school administrative unit after achieving teacher licensure.

(h) State Report. - No later than December 1, 2024, and annually thereafter for each year funds are awarded pursuant to the Program, the Department of Public Instruction shall aggregate the information provided pursuant to subsection (g) of this section and report that information to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee. (2023-134, s. 7.44(a).)

INTRODUCTION

North Carolina Session Law 2023-134 (§115C-269.31) directs the Department of Public Instruction to expand the Teacher Assistant Tuition Reimbursement Grant Program statewide. The program provides tuition assistance to part-time or full-time teacher assistants employed in local school administrative units who are pursuing a college degree leading to teacher licensure. The General Assembly appropriated \$575,000 to fund grants of up to \$4,600 per participant, for up to four academic years, to cover tuition and fees at approved educator preparation programs.

For school year 2024-25, a total of 1,062 applications from 72 districts submitted applicants for consideration. As directed in §115C-269.31, the Department prioritized the distribution of these funds using the following rules:

- (1) Local school administrative units that received funds under the Teacher Assistant Tuition Reimbursement Pilot Program established in Section 8.29 of S.L. 2016-94, as amended by Section 7.20 of S.L. 2017-57, Section 6(m) of S.L. 2017-189, and Section 7.21 of S.L. 2018-5.
- (2) Local school administrative units located, in whole or in part, in a county with at least one local school administrative unit that received low-wealth supplemental funding in the previous fiscal year.
- (3) All other local school administrative units.

Adhering to the rules outlined above, districts were stratified into three priority groups. The number of teachers in each priority group is outlined in table 1.

Due to the high demand among applicants at Priority Level 1, the Department reduced the maximum reimbursement per teacher assistant from \$4,600 to \$2,846. This adjustment ensured that all individuals qualifying under Priority Level 1 received funding, albeit at a reduced amount, thereby fully utilizing the available appropriation. To provide the full statutory amount to all priority levels, the program would have required \$4,885,200 in funding. To fully fund Priority Level 1 alone at the original amount, an allocation of \$929,200 would have been necessary.

Table 2 identifies all of the districts that applied for teacher assistant reimbursements, the total number of teacher assistants in each district, the number of teacher assistants that applied for reimbursement, the amount allotted for reimbursement, the amount spent on reimbursement, the count of teacher assistants still employed in June 2025, and the count of teacher assistants that received licensure by June 2025.
